

Psychospiritual Approach on Mental Health for Flood Victims: A Structured Literature

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Abstract

Coastal states in the East face annual flooding, particularly during the monsoon season, presenting considerable challenges despite residents' efforts to prepare. In 2022, Terengganu experienced devastating floods that severely impacted several districts, leading to significant loss of life and property. Victims endured not only material losses but also deep trauma and emotional distress (Harian, 2022). A critical concern arising from this disaster is the struggle for acceptance, with many victims attributing their hardships to fate or external circumstances. Such tendencies may impede their ability to cope, ultimately disrupting personal and familial harmony. This research adopts a qualitative methodology, utilizing documentary analysis and interviews to identify an effective psychospiritual approach tailored for flood victims. Data will be analyzed through content analysis with ATLAS.ti version 7.5.6 software. The findings indicate that psychospiritual therapy can empower individuals by emphasizing the interconnectedness of physical, emotional, mental, and spiritual health. This approach is consistent with the holistic goals set forth by the National Philosophy of Education in 1987, which aims to support the well-being of both individuals and communities.

Introduction

The flood disaster that struck Terengganu in 2022 resulted not only in property destruction and loss of lives but also left the flood victims grappling with lingering trauma due to the unprecedented and unforeseen nature of the disaster. As this annual disaster phenomenon persists, the involved parties must orchestrate comprehensive post flood management (Irwan et al., 2016). However, attention must also be directed towards the psychological, emotional, and resilience repercussions on flood victims. Studies indicate that female flood victims consistently experience feelings of stress, anxiety, and fear (Norizan, 2016). Furthermore, mental responses observed in female flood victims often include disrupted thoughts,

reflecting worries about the future and a sense of aimlessness and purposelessness in life post-flood. This aligns with the findings of the Division of Mental Health (2008), which enumerates mental responses experienced by disaster victims, including disturbed thoughts, depression, trauma, sleep disturbances, heightened anxiety, and a proclivity to easily lose hope. This substantial decrease in the resilience of flood victims leads some to contemplate giving up on returning to normal life. Therefore, human resilience needs to be restored, especially from a spiritual perspective, through the application of Islamic psychospiritual elements, which are essential for cultivating a peaceful and serene well-being in life (Yahya, 2021)

Material and Methods

Important procedures from the systematic review approach were used in this study to collect a sizable number of pertinent material. After choosing keywords, similar terms were found by scanning dictionaries, thesauri, encyclopedias, and previous research. After identifying all pertinent terms, search strings for the Scopus and Education Resources Information Center (ERIC) databases were developed (see Table 1). In conducting our systematic literature review, we utilized both Scopus and Education Resources Information Center (ERIC) databases due to their recognized importance and power in academic research.

The questions are as follows below:

1. How do psychospiritual interventions affect the mental health outcomes of flood victims?
2. What psychosocial factors mediate the relationship between psychospiritual beliefs and mental health in flood-affected populations?

Screening

Screening of Papers for Inclusion and ExclusionThe search was conducted in Scopus and Education Resources Information Center. These libraries were selected due to their better results during the pilot test and most publications related to computers and education. Originally, studies were found 244 in Scopus and 787 in Education Resources Information Center (ERIC) without any parameter being selected. Studies were then selected based on inclusion and exclusion criteria. Inclusion criteria focused on articles directly addressing the use published in academic journals from 2020 to 2024. Conference papers, editorials and grey literature were also excluded to ensure the academic rigor of the review. The inclusion and exclusion criteria are listed in Table 1.

Distribution by Database

In total, 244 documents were excluded from consideration, which included conference papers, proceedings, dissertations, book chapters, editorials, magazines, reports, published prior to 2020. Following the removal of non-English studies and duplicates, the study sample decreased to 42 articles. The selection process occurred in two phases. Initially, titles and abstracts were reviewed, excluding studies unrelated to psychospiritual approaches practices. After this filtering and the elimination of duplicates, the sample was narrowed down to 202 articles. In the second phase, the introduction, methodology, and conclusion sections of the articles selected in the first phase were analyzed.

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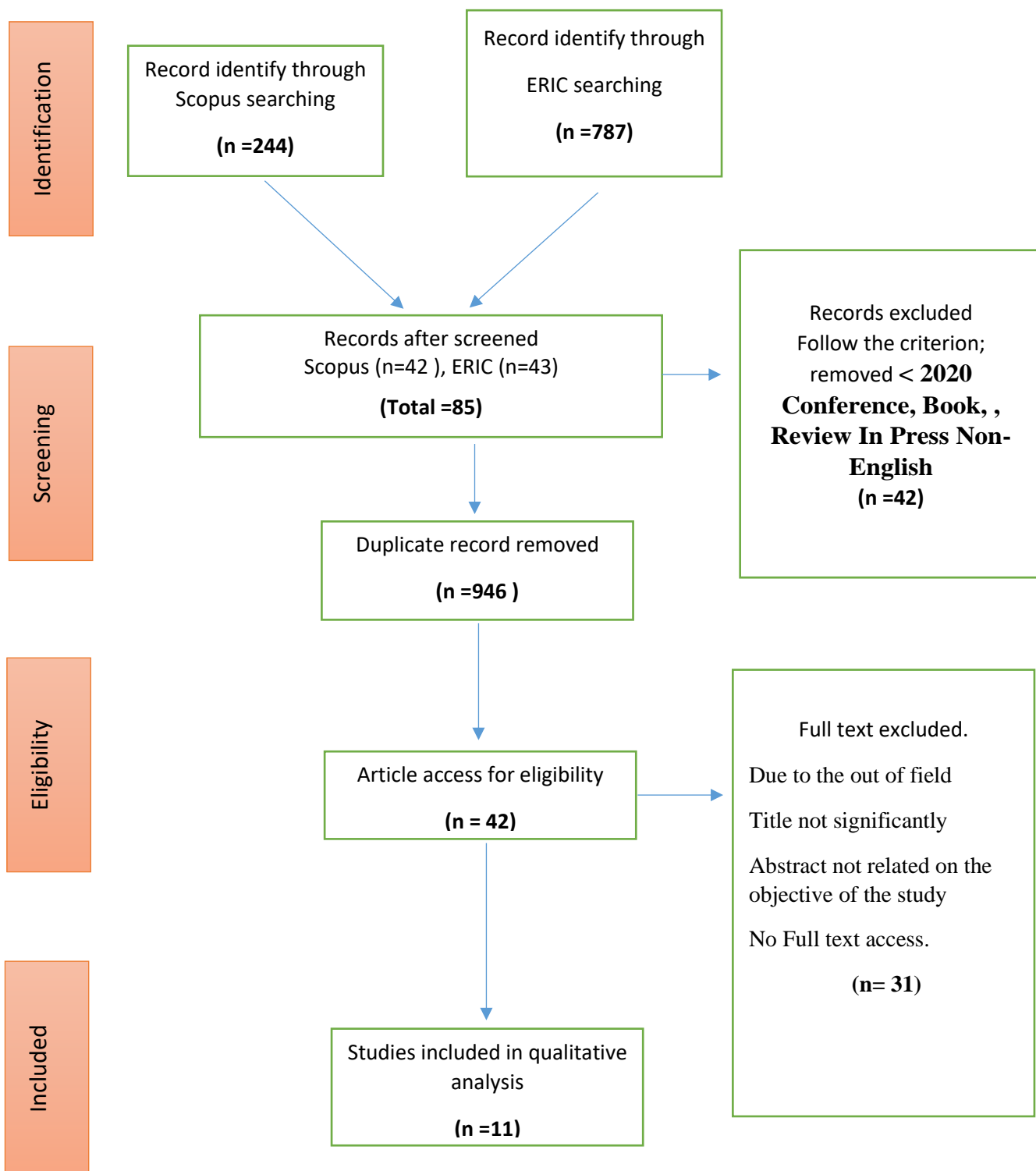


Figure 2. Flow diagram of the proposed searching study
